

Example	Description
Emergency Medical Technician Program	Students take introductory courses in 11th and 12th grades and then complete their EMT certification in summer following high school graduation.
Child Development Program	Students take CDEV work experience and lecture classes during the summer following graduation to prepare for work in SFUSDafterschool and childcare settings.
